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FTA On The Road

The Fuel Tax Administration Team has been taking to the road in recent months in an effort to more effectively address customer concerns, learn more about our customers business and their needs, address reporting challenges, and most importantly to build and strengthen relationships with our customers. These taxpayer visits also allow us to provide practical training opportunities to our Fuel Tax Examiners and it gives us the opportunity to train our customers on FTA policies and practices.

Historically, the FTA Program has made several taxpayer visits each year to visit customers that were struggling with the tax reporting process in an effort to help them remedy the problems they were having. While this is a valuable activity that we will continue, we have decided to find ways to expand upon this practice by attempting to get more "bang for our buck" while we're out on the road by visiting other customers along the way just to make a connection and learn about their business.

During these times of shrinking budgets, we are even more focused on finding efficiencies and getting the most out of every dollar we spend. Having said that and although our program does not have a large operating budget, we have decided that practical, technical employee training as well as customer service and relationship building are fairly high on our priority list. We've learned that the entire tax collection process becomes more efficient and effective with additional focus in these areas. We all become more effi-

cient when we are communicating more, proactively educating our team members and customers, and effectively addressing concerns before they become unmanageable. Additionally, learning about our customers needs gives us a better opportunity to anticipate their future needs which makes us even more effective. In light of these reasons, we have put priority on value added in-state customer visits, and we have already seen positive results from these visits.

We want our customers to know that we are open to traveling to their site to offer any assistance we can and learn from them while we are there. Again, budget cuts will impact our ability to make these visits to some degree, but we are committed to helping and we have a huge appreciation that filing monthly fuel tax returns is only a fraction of what our customers do to operate their businesses and fuel tax is our business. If we can help we want to, and we have found that in many cases it is more effective if we are at your location.

These visits have been well received by our customers and we want to say "Thank You" for being receptive to our visits and welcoming us into your businesses. Many times the statement "We're from the government and we're here to help" is met with skepticism, but we have found that once our customers learn that we are there to learn as well as help they are receptive to our visit.

Natural Gas

Got Gas? Wyoming does, plenty of it. According to USA Energy Information, Wyoming is ranked number three in natural gas production, so it's probably no surprise that there are several natural gas retail locations licensed with Fuel Tax Administration. Recently some of our team members had the opportunity to visit Encana's retail location located at Bailey Oil in Riverton, Wyoming. We would like to thank both James Ross and Mike Bailey for taking the time to let us tour their facilities and educate us about compressed natural gas.

With the influx of alternative fuels entering the market our intention is to be as

proactive as possible so we can inform you, our customers, of new reporting procedures. By touring the natural gas facility we have a more definitive understanding of how natural gas flows from bulk storage, to the retail pump and finally to a vehicle. Once the natural gas is used to propel a motor vehicle, it becomes fuel tax liable.

At this time we have not been enforcing whether suppliers, distributor/importer/exporters or retailers should or should not be licensed to sell natural gas for vehicle use, unless the only fuel type sold by a retail location

is natural gas. However, as we progress towards more natural gas being sold for vehicle use, we hope companies will license and remit fuel taxes so the monies can go towards maintaining the state's highways. Wyoming Department of Education data indicates, for the 2010-2011 school year, 45.8% of all students in LCSD #1, and 36.4% of all students in LCSD #2, qualified for free or reduced fee meals.

One of my "girls", Emma, developed autoimmune hemolytic anemia. This disease causes her body to attack itself and destroy her red blood cells. She became so ill so quickly that we just about lost her. She needed a blood transfusion and our local vet was not able to provide her with one. Fortunately, we live close enough to a wonderful veterinary hospital at Colorado State University. They have donor dogs who regularly give blood and were able to give Emma a transfusion the day she arrived and again a couple of

days later. After many tests and a week of hospitalization, she was able to return home. She's on medication and making very slow progress, accompanied by some setbacks. She will have to live with this disease forever and will have ongoing monitoring. Sitting in the waiting room at Colorado State Vet Hospital, we saw so many dogs, cats, birds, etc. coming to have medical help. It broke my heart to see so many three-legged dogs, dogs who need to be assisted to walk or to get up from a lying position, dogs with bandages on all different areas of their heads or bodies. I felt so blessed to have this location to take Emma with the hope of bringing her back home, and home to her sister-her litter mate-whom she'd never been away from for so long.

Dogs are such wonderful creations. They are

always honest. They love without questioning why. They help you up when you're feeling down. They are such characters that you can't help but laugh about them. When you come in the door, they make you feel like you've been gone for a year when you've only been gone for a half an hour. Coincidentally, on one trip to visit Emma while she was in the hospital, I read a bumper sticker on a car we passed on the highway. It said, "Life is short. Play with your dog."



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
