Meeting of July 18, 2008
Phone Conference

Chairman Jerry Kennedy called the meeting to order at 8:33 a.m.

Attendees – all by phone conference: Jerry Kennedy, Danny Glick, Jim Archerd, Lauri Wempen, Bob Wyatt, Marty McCoy, and Bob Symons

Discussion on WyoLink Portable Coverage Testing Methodology. Marty McCoy had prepared a methodology on providing portable radio coverage testing when requested by local agencies and this document has been provided to the Work Group for comments. When an agency requests WyoLink portable radio testing, it was suggested that the document be provided to them so that they can prepare for the testing.

Bob Wyatt made a motion to adopt the WyoLink Portable Coverage Testing Methodology. The motion was seconded by Jim Archerd. Motion passed on a verbal vote.

A current WyoLink map has been provided to the Work Group since the issuance of the FCC licenses. Most of the radio sites that have been using Special Temporary authorizations are now fully operational.

Marty McCoy had a very good meeting with the Bridger Teton National Forest for a site on Togwottee Overlook. Marty McCoy, Bob Wyatt and Bob Symons met with the Big Horn national Forest on July 1st and WyoLink will now pursue a lease for a radio site at Duncan Lake in the Big Horn National Forest. This site is within a current timber lease area.

Motion to adjourn by Marty McCoy, seconded by Bob Wyatt. Motion passed on a voice vote.

The meeting adjourned at 8:40 a.m.

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SALECS Working Group
Meeting of August 28, 2008

Attendees: William Westerfield – State Parks – Chairman, Steve DeCecco – Game and Fish– Telephone, Jim Siler – Wyoming Livestock Board, Patty Bauer – Highway Patrol Dispatch, Richard Bolin – Highway Patrol Dispatch, Bill Morse – Wyoming Highway Patrol, and Bob Symons – PSCC Administrative Support.

Chairman Westerfield called the meeting to order at 9:03 am.

Discussion on State Law Enforcement Communications System Rules

The SALECS Work Group was assigned the review of the State Law Enforcement Communication System Rules adopted in 1981 by then PSCC Chairman Steve DeCecco. Chairman Westerfield stated that he has reviewed the rules multiple times and feels that these rules could be abolished. The PSCC Rules and State Statute 9-2-1101 through 9-2-1104 have made these rules obsolete.

Bob Symons stated that the 1981 rules allow for the dispatch services to be charged to those state agencies that use the Wyoming Highway Patrol Dispatch. The PSCC Rules (Chapter 2, Section 5) allows for the PSCC to review the operational and maintenance requirements and expenditures to determine fees. And Chapter 2 Section 1 of the PSCC Rules states the PSCC “shall adopt policies and procedures to provide administrative guidance and control over the maintenance and operation of WyoLink and other State of Wyoming owned statewide radio communication systems”.

Discussion on the charging of fees for dispatch services. The intent of the PSCC rule was to allow the PSCC to set the fees for dispatching services since those services are part of the expenditures and operational costs for the SALECS radio system. The Wyoming Highway Patrol Dispatch Center makes the decisions on the agencies that they will provide dispatch services.

The policies and procedures for the SALECS radio system could be developed, if needed, by the PSCC.

Steve DeCecco made a motion to recommend the Public Safety Communication Commission adopt a rule to repeal the State Law Enforcement Communication Systems Rules – Rules 25, 27, 28 and 29 as filed by the Secretary of State. The motion was seconded by Richard Bolin and passed on a voice vote.

Discussion on SALECS migration to WyoLink

Chairman Westerfield asked about when the Wyoming Highway Patrol Dispatch would be ready for the transition of SALECS to WyoLink. The WHP Dispatch Center is capable of using WyoLink at this time and the Patrol may migrate some of the Highway Patrol Divisions this fall. A concern for

the WHP dispatch is the policies and procedures that Dispatch will be using for WyoLink. WHP Dispatch will be making significant changes as to the operation of the dispatch center when the migration to WyoLink occurs. The Dispatch Center would like to allow for the Highway Patrol migrate some users and see how this will affect the operators before adding more users.

Discussion on the reliability of the T-1 telephone lines to the dispatch centers. Qwest has replaced the Network Interface Unit Shelf and the stability of the T-1 lines has been corrected. Since this replacement no problems have been noted with the T-1 lines.

SALECS users should be looking after the first of the year before migrating to WyoLink. This is the least busy time of the year for radio communications with SALECS users. The SALECS users will need to have their radios programmed with the SALECS talkgroups and Agency talkgroups. The SALECS agencies need to finalize their talkgroup plans.

Discussion on the proposed SALECS talkgroups and SALECS regional map. Patty Bauer provided examples of how the dispatch center may be handling the calls to dispatch from SALECS users and compared the current use to WyoLink. Discussion on how the emergency button may be used by SALECS users. The SALECS users will have to make decisions on how the radios will be programmed including the buttons and how the talkgroups will be designed.

Discussion on the training that the users will need before migrating to WyoLink.

Being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 10:07 am.

WyoLink Support Manager's Report to the PSCC
September 9, 2008

As of Wednesday, September 3, 2008 there are 24 WyoLink sites operational. One of these (Casper Port of Entry) is operating at a very limited basis, with only two of five channels on line. This represents 51% of the 47 sites we are planning on having operational this year. As soon as a microwave connectivity issue is resolved we will have 33 sites operational, which will be 70% of the 47 sites we are planning on having operational this year. Chuck with the WYDOT Microwave Shop is working hand in hand with his microwave equipment technical support to resolve this problem as soon as possible.

Areas currently covered by WyoLink include I-80 from the Utah border to the Nebraska border as well as the south third of Lincoln County, the south east quarter of Fremont County, all of Albany, Platte, Goshen, Niobrara and Converse Counties as well as most of Natrona County. As soon as the issue with microwave connectivity is resolved, coverage will expand to include Weston, Crook, Campbell, Johnson and Sheridan Counties as well as the areas in Natrona County not currently covered.

Some of these 33 sites are operational at limited capacity, with between 3 and 4 of their 5 channels on line. This is due to either interference issues or frequency availability issues. The WyoLink Support Office is working with Motorola to resolve our interference issues. Motorola is reworking our frequency plan to identify alternative frequencies to fulfill some of our needs, and Bob Symons is working with FPIC (Federal Partnership for Interoperable Communications) to fulfill the rest by obtaining access to Federal frequency resources.

Weather, lease issues and equipment availability may cause a few of the 47 sites scheduled for 2008 completion to be delayed into 2009, but the WyoLink Support Office, Right of Way and Motorola are working hard to prevent this from happening. Of particular interest are the sites at Cheyenne Water Tower and Snow King. WyoLink has a signed lease with Union Wireless for the Water Tower Site, and the lease has been given to the Board of Public Utilities for their approval. We still need frequencies for this site, and Bob Symons is working with FPIC to gain access to Federal frequency resources for the Water Tower. Snow King needs 9 frequencies (out of 10) to become operational, and Motorola is working on finding these from our pool and from the FPIC. These frequencies could be the hold up in getting this site operational.

The Laramie County Combined Communications Center is up and operational, with Cheyenne Fire using their 800 MHz site on Fox Farm Road in Cheyenne on the WyoLink system. There were some issues with the configuration of their console equipment as well as with the T1 circuits between the WyoLink Master Site and the LCCCC, but Motorola and WyoLink worked side by side to resolve these issues.

WyoLink has a new Network Specialist, Scott Harris, who joined our team on July 28th. Scott brings 34 of years of experience with Qwest that we have tapped to bring us some much needed expertise with leased T1 circuits. This experience was very valuable as WyoLink and Motorola tackled issues with T1 circuits between LCCCC and the Master Site. Scott is rapidly becoming competent in codeplug generation and WyoLink system administration, and we are happy to have him on the team.

WyoLink Support Manager's Report to the PSCC
September 9, 2008

The WyoLink Support Office and Bob Symons have been working with several agencies to develop their talkgroup plan, and as a result, WyoLink is currently developing codeplugs for Wyoming Highway Patrol, WYDOT Maintenance and the Laramie County School District. We are confident that many others will follow in the near future, and we are up to the challenge.

Bob Symons and I have been working together to maintain a WyoLink Relationship Manager Database that is being used in combination with the WyoLink ListServ to send updates to WyoLink members and other interested parties. These updates include notices as additional WyoLink sites become operational, as well as issues that affect WyoLink users across the state.

The WyoLink Support Office continues to expand our knowledge and expertise with the WyoLink System, both with system administration and subscriber units. There are several upcoming training opportunities that WyoLink Technicians will be taking advantage of, including the opportunity to spend one-on-one time with Motorola System Technologists and Engineers.

Improving America's Security Act of 2007" House of Representatives Bill (H.R.1) has provided the state of Wyoming a Public Safety Interoperable Communications Grant for FY 2007

Prepositioning Interoperability Equipment: Included in the new grant is a requirement to preposition interoperability equipment within the state to be deployed in the event of a crisis or major disaster. This requirement will be accomplished by providing interoperative communications equipment to existing Regional Emergency Response Teams and the two Mobile Support Vehicles operated by the Wyoming Office of Homeland Security.

Distribution Formula: Eighty (80) percent of the grant must be allocated to local jurisdictions and tribal governments.

Match Requirement: This grant requires a 20 percent local or state match. No match is required for training purposes, but training expenses cannot exceed 20 percent of the total grant.
