

SUMMARY OF TRAFFIC LAW CHANGES | 2022

W.S. 31-5-301 MAXIMUM SPEED LIMITS: (Amended) Effective July 1, 2016, the following speeding violations for Wyoming drivers will be entered on the driving record as follows, except for those driving a commercial motor vehicle:

POSTED SPEED	DRIVING SPEED	DRIVING RECORD ACTION
80 mph	81-85 mph	WILL NOT go on the record
	86 mph or more	WILL go on record and count towards Suspension
75 mph	76-79 mph	WILL NOT go on the record
	80 mph or more	WILL go on record and count towards Suspension
70 mph	71-79 mph	WILL NOT go on the record
	80 mph or more	WILL go on record and count towards Suspension
65 mph	66-79 mph	WILL NOT go on the record
	80 mph or more	WILL go on record and count towards Suspension
60 mph	61-65 mph	WILL NOT go on the record
	66 mph or more	WILL go on record and count towards Suspension
55 mph	56-60 mph	WILL NOT go on the record
	61 mph or more	WILL go on record and count towards Suspension

NOTE: Any violations for exceeding the speed limit in a school zone, or construction zone will go on record.

COMMERCIAL VEHICLE: Note: Violations in the personal vehicle of a CDL holder may cause a disqualification.

W.S. 31-7-305 amended and effective July 1, 2022: This change adds a mandatory lifetime disqualification for any person convicted of using a commercial vehicle in the commission of felony human trafficking.

W.S. 31-7-110 amended and effective July 1, 2020: This change will increase the validity period of a commercial learner's permit from 180 days to 365 days.

W.S. 31-7-119 amended and effective July 1, 2019: This change will increase the validity period of a driver license from four (4) to five (5) years.

W.S. 31-7-402 amended and effective July 1, 2019: This change requires mandatory compliance of ignition interlock requirement before being issued a license without the restriction.

Effective August 15, 2018: Those drivers who are driving or being in actual physical control of a motor vehicle with a BAC of .08 or greater shall also be disqualified from obtaining or holding a commercial driver license for a period of one (1) year for the first offense and for a lifetime for a second or subsequent offense.
